## Why we want you

Our Community First Responders (CFR) are volunteers who are trained by us to attend certain types of emergency calls in the area where they live. Their aim is to reach a potential life-threatening emergency in the first vital minutes before the ambulance crew arrives. CFRs play an integral part in our response to patients within the local communities of where they live and work. As a CFR you will join your local scheme and attend medical and trauma emergencies, often providing vital interventions and support before the arrival of the ambulance crew. You will be provided with full training and support throughout your time with us as a CFR, through the Community Engagement & Training Team and your Scheme Coordinator.

## What you will be doing

- Attending a range of medical emergency calls both life threatening and non life threatening
- Attending calls on your own
- Providing reassurance to patients and families
- Representing South Central Ambulance Service
- Be part of a local CFR Scheme
- Represent and support South Central Ambulance Charity
- Support with fundraising and attending local community events

## The skills you need

- No formal qualifications or experience required
- Full driving licence, with 12 months experience and no more than 3 penalty points
- Good verbal and written skills
- Good and clear communication
- Good level of physical fitness (Occupational Health Screening will be required)
- Qualities that align with South Central Ambulance Service core values

## What's in it for you

- After training, CFRs will usually join a local scheme with other CFRs which

is led by a volunteer coordinator. Before going on call for the first time, volunteers will usually complete a shift with an experienced CFR or training officer from the Ambulance Service.

- Each area has a dedicated SCAS Community Engagement & Training Officer (CETO) who you can contact at any time for help or support. They are your main point of contact with the organisation.
- All training, uniform and equipment is supplied by the SCAS Charity (as the NHS receive no funding for the CFR role) and will be provided on successful completion of training.
- You will be in a position where you could save lives in your community. Our CFRs regularly attend patients who would have otherwise died without their intervention.
- You will be part of the wider SCAS 'family' and will be given the opportunity to work with ambulance crews and other emergency services as part of the role at the scene of an incident.
- As part of your training, you will complete a level 3 certificate in Ambulance First Response, which is a nationally recognised qualification.
- You will have many opportunities to expand your knowledge and training the longer you stay with us, including being trained to drive our vehicles, work in the Clinical Coordination Centre, and undertake some additional enhanced training to enable you to do more for our patients and your community.
